THE CITY STARTS HERE

Since 1973, the Fund for the City of New York's Public Service Awards Program has honored outstanding civil servants whose work performance and commitment to the public are extraordinary — they give their all each day, year after year. In honoring these winners, we also acknowledge the contribution and sacrifice of the hundreds of thousands of dedicated public servants who, with integrity and devotion, perform the work that keeps this complex city, the largest and most densely populated in the United States, running.

Sloan Public Service Award Winners demonstrate extraordinary service delivered with ingenuity, energy and compassion; responsiveness to public needs by cutting through red tape or developing more effective methods of service delivery; outstanding and reliable performance both under the pressures of daily routine and in times of crisis; willingness to take risks, if that is what is needed, to improve service or correct abuses or inequities; the ability to adapt to change and provide a continued high standard of service to the public; and commitment to upholding the public interest amidst competing interests, pressures and demands.



This year's winners, and the 315 winners from the previous 50+ years, were selected from among more than 300,000 eligible workers in the mayoral agencies, Transit and Housing Authorities, Health and Hospitals Corporation, City University of New York, district attorneys' offices and public libraries. Winners come from all levels and ranks of New York City's government with priority given to individuals who have made a career of public service.

To nominate a person, provide a description of the candidate, including significant career information, the particular achievements that occasion the nomination, and the qualities the nominee embodies.

Names go into a reserve pool, and each nominee is reviewed in due course. Recommendations, once made, need not be renewed.

The names of City employees who emerge with the strongest recommendations are submitted to the Selection Panel, an independent group of distinguished cross sector leaders who draw upon their experience with and knowledge of government. In deliberating and choosing the winners, panel members are guided by extensive profiles of each nominee that detail achievements, as well as panelists' own insights and evaluations.

Vimi Bhatia's journey from her early childhood in New York City to her transformative roles within the New York County District Attorney's Office demonstrates a profound commitment to public service and a relentless pursuit of justice. Growing up as a first-generation American with parents who overcame significant challenges, including discrimination and prejudice, instilled in Bhatia a sense of resilience and determination. From her studies in criminal justice and law to her internships in both corporate law firms and NGOs focused on human rights, Bhatia remained steadfast in her commitment to public interest law. Her tenure as an Assistant District Attorney in the Trial Bureau and subsequent roles in the Investigation Division of the D.A.'s Office allowed her to prosecute a wide range of cases, from street crimes to white-collar offenses, while never losing sight of her goal of serving the public good. In Bhatia's transition to the Manhattan Child Advocacy Center, she became the sole representative of the D.A.'s Office responsible for evaluating cases of child abuse and neglect. Her dedication to meticulously reviewing each case, participating in forensic interviews, and ensuring that victims receive the support and justice they deserve has earned her widespread recognition and praise from colleagues and partners alike. Her transformative impact at the Center, including streamlining communication processes and advocating for victims' rights, has cemented her reputation as a dedicated and compassionate advocate for vulnerable populations. Even as she takes on new challenges, such as her recent appointment as Deputy Chief of the Elder Abuse Unit, Bhatia remains committed to training her successor at the Child Advocacy Center and ensuring a seamless transition.

At COIB, Kipp initially served as a Junior Trainer, developing innovative methods to engage participants during conflict-of-interest training sessions. His theatrical background influenced his approach, making the sessions more relatable and interactive. Despite a brief hiatus due to budget cuts, he returned to the COIB and rose to the position of Director of Education & Engagement, a role he holds to this day. Kipp's impact on COIB's educational program has been significant, revitalizing it with creativity and originality. He utilizes multimedia content, including videos and social media, to make complex ethical topics engaging and accessible. His training sessions, attended by a wide range of public servants, are praised for their energy and interactivity. 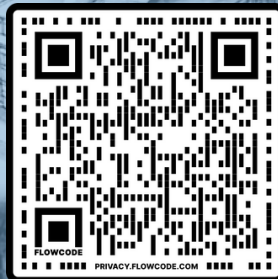
